

## Paul P. Harris The Founder



Paul P. Harris

aul Harris was born in 1868 to career, he decided to spend the next five In August, 1910, the National middle class parents in Wisconsin, USA. A financial crisis forced his parents to send Paul (3) and his elder brother Cecil (5) to their grandparents in Wellingford.

From his loving grandparents, Paul learned the values of tolerance, compassion and respect for fellow human beings – values that would form the very basis of the Rotary movement.

In 1891, 23 year old Paul was called to the Bar. But before starting on his legal

years travelling. With no money, he worked his way around the USA, Europe and the British Isles, braving enormous hardships, often hungry and working as a journalist, fruit picker, granite salesman, hotel clerk, cowboy and even an actor.

His law practice in Chicago was not an Emeritus for life. instant success and he often went Paul Harris died on January 27, 1947. hungry and lonely for days. The yearning for friends and fellowship was the genesis of the Rotary movement. On February 23, 1905, Paul, with three business friends started a club which, in time, would become a world-wide organization.

Association of Rotary Clubs was formed with Paul Harris as President. Three months later, this body was renamed Rotary International.

In 1912, Paul Harris resigned as President of Rotary International but was unanimously elected President

### Foreword



PRID M. K. Panduranga Setty Past President, Rotary Club of Bangalore

The Rotary movement reached a new milestone in pre-Independent India on June 5, 1934, and received its Charter from Rotary International on October 27 of the same year, at the hands of Rtn. H.W. Bryant of the Rotary Club of Bombay, Honorary Commissioner for India, Ceylon, Burma and Afghanistan, the first to be formed in the Garden City, the seventh in India (Charter President Rtn. L.J. McIver, with 33 members). This club also had the distinction in collaboration with Dr. Lata Jagannathan, Medical Director

from the TTK Group of Companies in 1984, of creating the Bangalore Medical Services Trust to celebrate its Golden Jubilee. As early as 1973, RCB  $\,$ initiated the concept of Voluntary Blood Donations in Karnataka. Among those who played a leading role in setting up the BMST were RCB's late Past Presidents P.T. Kasturi and Capt. V.V.K. Mani. Satellite Blood Centers have since been established in 10 hospitals. The Diamond Jubilee was marked by the building of the Rotary Muthappa Attavar Memorial Hospital at Chennasandra village near Uttarahalli in Bangalore South in 1993-94. Further facilities are envisaged here.

Rotary Club of Bangalore has thrown up a succession of fine, dedicated leaders and members right from the beginning, devoted to a wide spectrum of services at various levels – City, State, National, Regional and International, in keeping with the spirit of Service Above Self, in all the Avenues.

Among those who nurtured RCB from its chartering in 1934 were some of the finest minds including Dewans and Administrators of the State, British Officers from the Cantonment area, Educationists, a former Chief Justice, a Vice-Chancellor of the University and other luminaries. There were top businessmen and experts from different professions.

We should never forget RCB was Platinum Jubilee plaque. The inspiring to RCB during the Presidential tenure sponsored by the Rotary Club of Madras, its Past President presenting Real." an ivory and gold Presidential hammer to our RCB, which is still in use today.

In 1991-93 I had the honour of being the first Past President from this part of the country to become a Director on the Board of Rotary International.



At this organization meeting, it was decided that a Rotary Club be formed in Bangalore. The provisional Rotary Club of Bangalore came into existence on May 24, 1934 with 25 Charter Members. sponsor club was the Rotary Club of Madras.

The grand

inauguration The Rotary Club of Bangalore was

formally inaugurated on June 5, 1934. The meeting at the Central Hotel followed a splendid luncheon. A large gathering attended the function presided over by Rtn. L.J.McIver, ICS, Collector and District magistrate of the Bangalore Civil and Military Station (popularly known as the Cantonment). He was the privileged Founder President of this unit of Rotary service.

The Chief Guest of the occasion was the Hon. Lieut-Col. C.T.C.Plowden, British Resident in Mysore. The sponsor club, the Rotary Club of Madras, sent five envoys of goodwill and fellowship. They were Rtn. R.Jackson, Rtn. Maj.W.S.E.Money, Rtn. C.Rajagopalachari, Rtn. Dr. P.V.Cherian and Rtn. M.E.Morris.

In his short speech, Rtn. Pres. McIver welcomed the Resident and said that his presence indicated his sympathy for the Rotary ideals and his conviction that in Bangalore there was scope for putting these ideals into practice. He paid tribute to Rtn. Douglas Howland and the "quiet, un-assuming and efficient manner in which he had put forward the aims and ideals of the Rotary movement".

Pre. McIver also referred to the messages of felicitation received from Bombay, Calcutta and Lahore, and extended a warm welcome to the Rotarians from the sponsor club of Madras.

In a touching gesture Rtn. Maj. Money, Past President of the Rotary Club of Madras, presented a beautiful 'Presidential Hammer', made of ivory and gold, to the Bangalore Club. He emphasized that the Hammer was "not a present merely, but the forging of a link in the bond of fellowship so essential in all Rotary endeavour". (The 'Presidential Hammer' presented

by the Rotary Club of Madras is being used even today).

Rtn. Jackson then spoke on "Rotary as it applies to Bangalore". In his stirring address, Rtn. Jackson shared his experiences as a past president of the Madras Club, outlined the objects of Rotary, stressed the need for patience, and gave practical advice on the functioning of the Club. "Please remember", he said "that it has been very truly remarked that 'a wheel can only travel in one direction unaided and that is downhill'. This is very true of the Rotary Wheel. Without the enthusiasm and assistance of all your members, the Club cannot flourish".

### Charter night

The charter of Rotary International was presented to the Rotary Club of Bangalore on October 27, 1934. It was Rtn. H.W.Bryant of the Rotary Club of Bombay and Honorary Commissioner for Afghanistan, Burma, Ceylon and India, who represented Rotary International and handed over the Charter. This historic meeting was held at the West End Hotel in a hall resplendent with Rotary motifs, the walls draped with International flags and the Rotary Wheel. The meeting was preceded by dinner.

Hon. Lieut-Col. C.T.C.Plowden, British Resident in Mysore, graced the occasion and proposed toasts to His Majesty, the King Emperor and His Highness, the Maharaja of Mysore.

The sponsor club, the Rotary Club of Madras, sent three emissaries of brotherhood - Rtn. Jackson, Rtn. Money and Rtn. Luker.

Presenting the Charter, Rtn. Bryant felicitated the Bangalore Club on the

rapid progress already made in that short span of five months. He remarked that the decorations on the wall that evening and the very fine menu card were evidence of the enthusiasm with which the Club was working.

Rtn. Bryant emphasized that in all Rotary activities, it was essential not to be in too much of a hurry. Each individual should fully imbibe the spirit of Rotary. It is through the efforts of these individuals rather than those of the group that the objects of Rotary could be fully realised. He stressed the importance of 'service' and said that the Community Service Committee was the 'real pivot' of the Club. Describing Bangalore and its surrounding as a promising field for service projects, Rtn. Bryant exhorted the members to interpret and apply the word 'service' in its fullest and widest sense.

He then presented the Charter and conveyed the good wishes and congratulations of R.I.President Hill, of the Rotary Club of Chicago, and the other officers of Rotary International.

Rtn. Pres. Melver assured Rtn. Bryant and the officials of Rotary International that "it would be the endeavour of each and every member of the Rotary Club of Bangalore to do his best to promote the aims and objects of the Rotary movement.

"In the past five months they have laid a 'strong foundation for the future growth of Rotarian endeavour in the station and in the city".

He expressed appreciation of the efforts of Secretary Munro of the Rotary Club of Bangalore and Rtn. Jackson of the Rotary Club of Madras, and thanked the latter for the invaluable advice he had given at the inaugural meeting.

Rtn. B.G.Rajagopala Mudaliar proposed a toast to all the sister clubs in India and thanked them for their help and goodwill. He expressed gratitude, in particular to the Rotary Club of Madras, for its staunch support and encouragement.

Rtn. Jackson suggested close association between the Madras and Bangalore Clubs, and proposed joint meetings at least once in two months.

After toasts to the guest and the members present, there was an impromptu concert, in which all the Rotarians present participated.

It is of interest to record that Rtn. Herbert W.Bryant, who presented the Charter, settled down in Bangalore on his retirement from professional activities in Bombay. For about a decade, till his death in June 1960, he was a member of the Rotary Club of Bangalore, and took keen interest in it activities. Senior members would recall with gratitude, the friendliness and guidance of this erudite Rotarian.

### Meteoric Progress

The growth of Rotary in Bangalore was spectacular - both in terms of time and magnitude.

This is aptly described by Rtn. V.S.Bhatia, who, writing in The Bangalore Rotarian (June 1954) said: "It was not the imposing statistics and figures relating to the Rotary Club in the world, that helped in creating an

interest in Rotary among Bangaloreans, but the quiet and unassuming work of a few sincere individuals like Mr. Howland, Sir Frederick James, Mr. McIver, Dr. N.S.Subba Rao and others, who succeeded in making a Rotary Club in Bangalore an accomplished fact, and not only a pious dream".

Any social organization should reflect the ethos of the society in which it functions. And should be able to adjust itself to the changing characteristics of the environment.

The late PDG. D.N.Hosali has described the mood of Bangalore in the 1930's and the changing patterns over the next two decades in his inimitable style (The Bangalore Rotarian, Oct-Nov. 1956): "The story of Rotary in Bangalore from the 'thirties to the fifties is, in fact, the story of the profound social and economic changes

that have taken place in the country during the period. Bangalore during the 'thirties had rather unique set-up. The city which was under the rule of Maharajas with a succession of very eminent men as Dewans and Administrators, had the suave oldworld charm peculiar to Indian States. The Cantonment under the administration of the Government of India through a Resident, high military brass, and British Civil Service men, had a highly westernized atmosphere. Rotary, at its inception in Bangalore, was formed by enlisting members from these two diverse groups of men and brought about a happy commingling of the best in the oriental and occidental culture.

Rotary then was indeed exclusive, nay, even snobbish and highbrow. Membership of the Rotary Club then was a stamp of one's social position and status. It was indeed difficult to join. The top officials from the two areas, the City and the Cantonment, with a sprinkling of very few business and professional men, constituted the club.

The fellowship and camaraderic were, of course, excellent. The luncheons and dinners, with their fine cuisine, glittering silver and choice wines, were a delight to the gourmet. But this is not to say that the ideals of Rotary were forgotten. In its own way, the Club did bestow considerable attention on community welfare and thus laid the foundation of what it is today.

In the 1940's the process of democratization started. From a bare 34, the membership rose to about 60 in 1942. This period saw the influx of a number of Indian businessmen, with the simultaneous exit of many Britishers who had to leave as a result of their preoccupation with the war.

The Club which used to be predominantly European, became distinctly Indian, and a handful of European members were left. Alongside, there was another change. The turbaned and immaculately dressed Civil Service men from the State, yielded place to the younger generation of Indian businessmen, until at the end of the 'forties the Club became what Rotary ought to be. A forum of business and professional men, united in the ideal of service.

"As one reflects on the atmosphere of the Club during those early days, one cannot deny its obvious excellence in certain spheres, as well as its drawbacks in certain others. There were undoubtedly great brains in the Club then, to wit K.V.Anantharaman, Ranga Rao, N.S.Subba Rao, who are, alas, no more, and people like N.Madhava Rao, former Dewan, and P.Medappa, former Chief Justice, who

still shine in the social firmament as luminaries. A Rotary meeting during those day was indeed an intellectual repast, and the younger members could literally sit at the feet of the masters and learn lessons about men and life. The proof of this statement can be seen in the fact that some of the younger men, who were brought up in the traditions of these men, have today grown into important personalities in Rotary. Dr. Mahadevan to whom Rotary in South India owes more than to any other individual, is a product of this school".

Right from its inception, the Club has had the good fortune of being able to

draw the very best talents from the sophisticated elite of Bangalore. The Presidents and other members of the Board as well as a select band of dedicated Rotarians have been giving the Club the benefit of their wisdom and leadership to keep it in a preeminent position in the Rotary world, and its activities evenly spread over all the avenues of Rotary service.

The Club developed both internally and externally, taking credit for sponsoring 22 new clubs, and giving Rotary International 17 distinguished District Governors. The Club also had

the privilege of holding several District Conferences, District Assemblies and Intercity meetings, spreading the gospel of 'Service Above Self' in the backward area of the southern region.

During the initial period, the progress made by the Club was largely due to the indirect Governmental support which it received in large measure. After the attainment of political independence, a re-orientation of the prospects and the programmes of Rotary to suit the altered status of a free country was necessary and Club adjusted itself quickly to a fast-changing political and social environment.

A new sense of responsibility and awareness of the social needs of the community has marked the Community Service activities of the Club. Among the outstanding service projects undertaken during the last 75 years are the adoption of a number of villages around Bangalore; building houses and providing water / electricity; setting up of educational, occupational, medical and recreational

facilities; construction o hospitals with special wards and donation of equipment; donation of ambulances and a mobile dispensary to hospitals and other institutions. Two ambitious Golden Jubilee projects - Blood Bank and Burns Ward, were also completed in the 1980's.

Considerable work has been done for the physically and mentally handicapped. Through the Book Bank Scheme, mid-day meals, school uniforms and scholarships, the Club has continuously provided opportunities to needy and deserving students to pursue their studies without hardship.

For the youth, tremendous fillip has been provided through career guidance programmes, elocution and essay competitions, general knowledge contests and sports meets. Among the young service projects undertaken by the Club are : scholarships - Rs.350 per head for the mid-day meals of needy college students and Rs.300 per head for deserving students in normal schools and those for the handicapped; donations for purchasing playground equipment and teaching aids to schools for the handicapped (including the Shraddhanjali Integrated School and the School for the Deaf run by NASCOH, Karnataka); General Knowledge Contest for college students for the late Ramnarayan Chellaram Shield; and Inter-School Swimming Competition (Aqua-Roto) for the late B.Rudra Shields.

As part of the Golden Jubilee celebrations, the 'Young Activities Committee gave a "piggy bank" to all members of the Club. The money from this collection was used to give scholarships to deserving children.

better employer-employee relationships and buyer-seller relations through various projects. Business conferences, consumer products programmes and world community exhibitions, etc., have also been service. common activities.

The Club has been equally active on the international services front as well. Its contribution to the Rotary Foundation has been truly commendable. As on

December 31, 1984, the Club had 71 Paul Harris Fellows and 29 Paul Harris Sustaining members, with a total accumulated contribution of US \$84,450.59. With this, the Club had reached a 4,300% plateau.

The Club has endeavoured to build Sister club relations have been established with three clubs, and the Club has actively participated in the GSE and Student Exchange

> This then is the story of the Rotary Club of Bangalore in a nutshell. From a humble beginning in 1934 with just 25 members, it has grown dramatically, and can today boast of having over 240 members on its rolls. All through its 75 significant years of existence, the club has cherished and upheld the noble credo outlined by the founder Paul Harris - of sincere fellowship and the value of service.

While the Platinum Jubilee Year has helped the Club to take stock of its achievements and failures over the past years, it is also the time to gear up to shoulder greater responsibilities and to envision more projects to serve larger segments of humanity. In this mission, the Club can hopefully and proudly depend on the wisdom and magnanimity of its enthusiastic members

And so the march continues, into another decade, another century and into eternity.

## A School that brings smiles all around

The Rotary Seva Bharathi Vidyalaya at Nagadevnahalli village in Bangalore is at the centre of the Platinum Jubilee Celebrations of the Rotary Club of Bangalore. Rotarian Narayanan Suresh provides a first hand report about the school which is making a huge difference to the students and the people in the village on the outskirts of Bangalore.

Fourteen-year-old Nagendra is of medium build, with intense eyes. This class 9 student is one of the rare children of his age who looks forward to the daily routine of his school on the outskirts of Bangalore.

For, the Rotary Seva Bharathi Vidyalaya, abutting a busy road that runs through Bangalore University's Jnanabharati Campus, off Mysore



Road, is an institution with a difference. That is what draws Nagendra and 594 other children from lower middle class families in the neighborhood to the school daily.

Nagendra recalls the days when his life turned topsy turvy when his father, a farmer, passed away when he was barely 8 years old. He was studying in Class 3 in a convent school in Mandya district in the heart of Karnataka's Sugar City, 100 km from Bangalore. Left with no other support at home, Nagendra's mother Sujatha moved into her brother's house in the

Nagadevanahalli village.

Both mother and child were determined to continue the studies and the Rotary owned, Seva Bharathi run (a Non Governmental Organization, active in education field) school in the same village came in handy.

Education is almost free at the school. Children pay a nominal monthly fee ranging from Rs.60 to Rs.110 which is used mainly for the basic maintenance of the school, says Principal Mrs. T.Sudha, RCB's Rotarian Prabhu Chandran from his family 'Janani' Trust provides all the school children with two sets of uniforms, two pairs of shoes, all books, notebooks and stationary.

The 'Janani' Trust also bears the cost of salaries for the teaching staff and the highly nutritious lunch served every day for all the school children. All Rotarians are truly grateful and

indebted to Rtn. Prabhu Chandran for his great generosity.

Worried about the corruption and lawlessness on the city outskirts, Nagendra wants to become a police officer. Thanks to the availability of all these facilities, Nagendra's younger



brother too has now enrolled at the school.

Almost each one of the 595 children in the school have a similar story to tell. How the Rotary Seva

Bharathi Vidyalaya is a beacon of hope for them. But for this school, they all would have been part of the army of child labourers, even though the practice is banned by law. There are still over 4 million child labourers in

India

The school at Nagadevanahalli is part of the Rotary Club's efforts to provide meaningful support to the community, said Rotarian C.K. Sreenathan, President, Rotary Club of Bangalore. The Rotary Club of Bangalore, celebrating its 75th anniversary this year, set up the school in 1961 and its Charitable Trust had bought the land for a "princely sum" of Rs.500 then, to build a school for the village community.

Today, 48 years later, the school is a beehive of activity, with its nearly 600 children. The Club, as part of its Platinum Jubilee Celebrations, has embarked on an ambitious Rs.1.4 crore project to provide the children with a modern building with all the latest educational aids. Nearly 80 percent of the funds required have been raised through voluntary contributions from the Club's 239 members. Rtn. Sreenathan is hopeful of raising the balance amount too in the near future. The construction work got over and the

school's new block was inaugurated on September 21, 2009.

With 19 full time teachers and 6 nonteaching staff, Principal Sudha is the quintessential leader who is driving the school to great heights. In the latest state-level Class 10 board examination, the school recorded 72 percent pass percentage. Ten of the students got marks of 60 percent and more. Mrs. Sudha is targeting a cent percent pass percentage for the school in the near future. Remedial and extra preparatory classes have been introduced. The school, even with its limited resources, is straining every nerve to provide facilities comparable to that given to students in elite schools, in terms of academic preparation.

With a new building and more support from the ever-willing Rotarians, the small in size but big hearted school is all set to continue its mission of bringing a smile to the lives of the people in the community where it is located.



## September 21, 2009 Platinum Day Etched in Collective RCB Memory

or exactly 120 long minutes, time stood still at RV Dental College Auditorium on Monday, September 21, 2009 when hundreds of Rotarians from many parts of Karnataka and Chennai gathered to celebrate the Platinum Jubilee of the city's oldest and India's fifth oldest Rotary Club, the Rotary Club of Bangalore (RCB) in the presence of the future and the past presidents of the 104-year parent body, Rotary International.

"There are very few organizations in the world that have survived for more than 75 years. And RCB has not just survived but continued to grow from strength to strength with every passing year," stated the visiting Rotary International President-Elect (RIPE) for 2010-11, Rtn Ray Klinginsmith while kicking off the Club's Platinum

Jubilee celebration

"RCB was formed during the golden period of Rotary in 1934 when the economic recession was at its peak. It was among the dozens of Rotary Clubs that came up during this period around the world," recalled Rtn Klinginsmith. "Probably its formation, like that of its contemporaries were spurred by the innate desire of humans to help each other and help those who need it the most through voluntary service."

The evening began with the innovation rendered by the mellifluous duo of Annes, Lalitha Shivaprasad and Dr Chandrika Rao. And Rtn Klinginsmith, RI Director Rtn K R Ravindran, Past RI President Rtn William Boyd lit the lamp to signal the beginning of the evening's Platinum date with history.

There was another surprise in store for the assembled Rotarians and RCB's well-wishers. An ornately decorated palanquin moved through the aisles to reach the dais. To every one's delight, a beautiful fairy ( Tanushree Bhaskar) emerged from the palanquin to hand

over a wrapped packet. Rtn Klinginsmith wripped open the cover to pull out the first copy of "The Platinum Club", a 300-page commemorative volume that captured the rich history of the Rotary Club of Bangalore in all its glory. The threeyear efforts of the Platinum Jubilee Commemorative Volume Committee, chaired by Rtn K Shankar, reached its logical conclusion on the stage at that moment. RI Director Rtn K R Ravindran then released a special, 8page issue of Rotator brought out specially for the occasion by the magazine committee chairman and cochairman, Rtn Zarir Batha and Rtn Naravanan Suresh.

#### Landmarks Galore

It was not just RCB that was making history on Monday. The RIPE has completed 50 years in Rotary. And he was greeted on stage by RCB's own half-centurion, PRID M K Panduranga Setty, chairman of the Platinum Jubilee Committee. He completed a personal Platinum landmark too as September 21 was his 75th Birthday too. The "beacon of our club" as PRID Pandu was described by many a speakers during the day basked in the glory with his trademark smile. In the audience was another half-centurion, N Vithaldas who too had completed his 50 years in Rotary earlier in 2009.

To add to the historical moment was the presence of a 5-member delegation of Rotarians from RCB's parent club, the Rotary Club of Madras (RCB), which sponsored RCB in 1934. RCM,

chartered in 1929 had just completed its 80 years of existence. Hundreds of Rotarians from the 22 clubs sponsored by RCB in the last 75 years, and the "grand child clubs" which were in turn chartered by these "RCB babies" too were present to bask in the historical recently.

Rtn Klinginsmith expressed his admiration about the hundreds of land mark community projects completed by RCB since 1934. "What is more important is that even if RCB had not rendered any of these services, just the fellowship fostered by it in the last 75 years just would have been enough to make Bangalore a better place," said an admiring Rtn Klinginsmith.

More than anything else, the RIPE said the astounding fact about RCB was that it has truly fostered the Rotary spirit of conducting itself with the highest ethical standards and inculcate the value of public service uninterruptedly for 75 years.

#### A Glimpse Into The Past

The stage was then left to PRID Pandu to recollect the rich history of the Club. He recalled the names of stalwarts like the Bangalore city administrator McIver who formed the club with 25 members hailing from the elite sections of the city. Other prominent RCB members from the initial decades included Rtn M S Thacker who headed to New Delhi to later head the 40laboratory national chain of CSIR laboratories, Rotarians K V Anantharaman, D N Hosalia and Vishnu Ghatge. PRID Pandu recalled with pride the presidential tenure of Rtn Dr Homi J Bhabha (1954-55) who went on to set up India's nuclear establishment after his move to Mumbai..

PRID Pandu said the Club had plunged into social service right from the start and was active in health and education sectors. RCB had set up homes for destitute people, provided drinking water supply to villages near Bangalore, and organized medical

camps in the initial years.

An important contribution, PRID Pandu said, was that RCB has 494 Paul Harris Fellows (PHFs) and 9 Major Donors to the RI kitty.

Past President Rtn K Vijaykumar then made an elaborate presentation on the varied nature of community projects undertaken by RCB since 1934. One of the major contribution in the initial years was the donation of an X-ray machine costing Rs 50,000 then now it costs 20 times more) to the government-run Victoria Hospital in the city in the 1930s. The weekly newsletter, Rotator, was launched on India's Independence Day (August 15) in 1952. The Club has so far provided 17 District Governors to the Rotary District

Rtn Vijaykumar said the pioneering Blood Bank project started by the Club in 1985 was a trendsetter for the country. Run by the Bangalore Medical Services Trust, jointly with TTK, the Blood Bank provides essential blood products to more than 30,000 needy patients every month. The Menda Education Trust set up by RCB member, Rtn Arjun Menda, in 2005 has a corpus of Rs 55 lakh to provide 75 scholarships to deserving students every year. He said the Club gave a record \$ 66,000 to the Rotary Foundation in June 2009. Another important activity is the holding of the Ramnarayan Chellaram Knowledge Quiz contest by RCB without a break since 1959. This is the world's second largest running quiz programme.

RCB also did some major humanitarian work to rehabilitate the Tsunami victims of December 2004. The Club has donated more than Rs 22 lakh for this and carried out rehabilitation work in collaboration with the Rotary Club in tsunami-hit Nagapattinam town of Tamil Nadu.

It was then time to recognize the great work done by all the Past Presidents of

the Club. President C K Sreenathan, PRIP Willam Boyd and RIPE Rtn Klinginsmith personally handed over a plaque to past presidents, PRID Pandu, M K Ramachandra, M P Talwar, M Srinivasa Rao, Phiroze Bharda, K Shankar, Dr Prithvi Raval, Hari Parameshwaran, K N Prabhashankar, K Bettaiah, S S Ramdas, Dr SG Ramnarayan Rao, Amarnath Kamath, Dr Pradeep Rao, G Manohar Row, K V Pradeep, GV Radhakrishnan, Dr Gopinath Ghorpade, Lal Bhatia, K Vijaykumar and of course, CK Sreenathan.

Secretary Ram Kumarr Seshu then thanked every one individually for their efforts to make the Platinum Jubilee function a flawless, memorable event to cherish for our lifetime. A sumptuous dinner followed on the lawns of RVDC.


