ur club records show that during 1947-48 it adopted and sponsored a welfare centre at Kadugodi village near Whitefield. This establishment was built and maintained by Col. Bennet of the Indian Ordinance and Welfare Depot. Among other welfare operations was a Primary School, Creche and Nursery. The Rotary Anns assumed responsibility for the upkeep of this Primary School.

This programme instilled an awareness in our members of the need to provide education facilities to the needy. This was the beginning and Rotarians started looking for ways and means to provide for needy students and help in their education.

Scholarships to individual students examination fees, and in some cases hostel expenses; during 1970-71 a core fund of Rs.50,000/- was created with monthly scholarship to a slum child at Rs.500/- per month.

During 1946-47 an amount of Rs.12,500/- being the proceeds of a benefit dance recital by Mrinalini Sarabhai was presented to the Mysore University for awarding scholarship to the poor students out of the interest accruing on it.

The club began taking interest starting in 1948-49, in a hostel for harijans at Seshadripuram, the foundation for which was laid by Mahatma Gandhi. More than 400 Harijan children of tender age were being educated and maintained in the Hostel. The club rendered much financial help for running the institution.

Donated the Rotary Block, of four rooms on the first floor of the Ramakrishna Vidyarthi Mandiram at Basavanagudi, during 1965-66. A unique concept was put in action by constructing four shops at Anatha Sishu Nivas at N.R.Colony. This enabled sustained and regular income to support orphans, numbering 37. The project was acclaimed by social organisations.

The first school building on a two acre plot at Nagadevanahalli was constructed in 1960-61 and handed over to the Panchayat which was entrusted with the running of the school.

The outstanding and pioneering project of the school was the Book Bank scheme which brought in accolades. Details of the programme are provided in this issue.



### Book Bank Scheme

he Rotary Club of Bangalore has always had a soft corner for the student community, particularly the needy and deserving ones.

Time after time, the Club and its members have come forward. collectively or individually, with schemes and assistance. To provide clothing, food, books and other study materials and medical aid so that the students are in no way handicapped; to motivate and encourage them for better performance in every field; to build up character and leadership; to afford opportunities for higher studies within the country and abroad; to give career guidance. The list is long.

The Book Bank Scheme is perhaps the Club's crowning glory. Started in June 1959 as a Silver Jubilee Project, this surpassed all expectations, and its

realized by the Central and State Governments. The project was colleges, and was well spoken of by prominent organs of public opinion.

The Scheme found its origin in 1955 when the first Book Bank was set up in the Ramnarayan Chellaram College of Commerce by the Rotary Club of away in 1970. His place was taken by Bangalore.

Rtn. Ramnarayan Chellaram realised The ruling President of the Rotary Club the problems faced by students, particularly in professional colleges. With the exorbitant price of text-books, many students had to depend solely on lecture notes, often handed down, sometimes incorrect. The Book Bank Scheme was started to help needy students to pursue their studies. It was jointly sponsored by the Rotary Club of Bangalore and the Ramnarayan Chellaram and Sons Charitable Trust. An initial contribution of Rs.25,000/was made by the Trust and the Chellaram family.

Rtn. K.Eeswari Prasad was Secretary till 1964. Since then Rtn. K.R.Subramanyam has held the post.

Within a few months of its formation, the Society collected more than a lakh of rupees, and the first Book Banks were established in medical, engineering and commerce colleges in Bangalore. Up to 1967, the Society collected funds to the tune of Rs.4 lakh. This included Rs.95,000 in grants from the Government of Mysore, Rs.30,000/- from the Government of India, Rs.44,000 from the Mysore State Students Welfare Fund and Rs.15,000/- from the Nizam of Hyderabad's Charitable Trust. Generous amounts were also obtained from patron, vicepatron, donor, life and associate life members of the Society.

The Society received significant assistance and co-operation from abroad. The largest contribution by far, came from the Asia Foundation – over 20,000 books and 4,000 journals worth about Rs.3,50,000/-.

Gifts from the International Rotary Community included books from the Rotary Clubs of Indo and Hollywood, USA; Manurewa, Waiuku, Pukekohe and New Lynn in New Zealand, and Rotary District 669, USA. The scheme was soon recognized as extremely worthwhile, and a documentary was produced by the Government of India for screening all over the country. All India Radio broadcast a talk on the Society.

Thanks to the active interest of the Working Group of the Public Cooperation Division of the Planning Commission, Rs.10,000/- was allocated by the Government of Mysore to organize a training programme for officials and volunteer workers from other States, to enable them to study and implement the Book Bank Project in their own areas.

The University Grants Commission has since sanctioned lakhs of rupees towards the establishment of text-book lending libraries in the educational institutions all over the country.

Other Rotary Clubs in India undertook to set up student aid societies and text-book lending libraries, egged on by the All India Extension Programme started in December 1963.

In 1964, to perpetuate the memory of Pandit Jawaharlal Nehru, the Ramnarayan Chellaram and Sons Charitable Trust contributed Rs.50,000/- to set up Jawaharlal Nehru Book Banks in 10 engineering college in 10 different States. Pandit Nehru had graciously consented to lend his name to the Book Bank in Bangalore, although he had generally discouraged the use of his name for Institutions, during his life-time.

In 1966, the Society launched a new scheme, "Name the Book Bank after the Donor", by which a donor contributing Rs.2,000/- could have the Book Bank named after him. The institution was required to contribute Rs.1,000/- failing which the donor had to pay the entire amount of Rs.3,000/-. Within two years, 39 such donors had come forward with their contributions.

Also in 1966, Ramnarayan Chellaram and Sons Charitable Trust donated a further sum of Rs.25,000/- to establish Jawaharlal Nehru Book Banks in

Ceylon, Singapore, Hongkong, Malaysia and Nepal through the Rotary Clubs in these countries.


Till today the Society has established 80 Book Banks in Karnataka and six other States. About Rs.20 lakhs worth of text-books have been distributed, serving more than 35,000 needy and deserving students in various disciplines.

## Nagadevanahalli Project of the year

### The Village

Nagadevanahalli is a small village in Kengeri Hobli of Bangalore South District and hardly 14 km from the city. A tiny village indeed and the people are poor. The land is poor and hardly supports a crop a year on dry land. A handful of the residents have jobs in the urban city; while the others work their land and seek labour opportunities during off season. They say the area was covered by a green forest 35 years ago. Now, we see only parched brown land. Every household treks at least a kilometer to fetch a poll of water. This then is the village that our club decided to work with. And, there is sufficient reason.

### Approach Road

The village has an easy access by road, situated between Bangalore University and Kengeri Satellite Town, and on the road connecting these two places. To reach the village, you have an option. In the first case, you get into the Bangalore University campus from Bangalore-Mysore Road, travel about 2 km, where you have the bus stand and the University library; take a left turn and almost immediately you are on a kutcha road leading you directly into the village. The other way is you continue to travel on Mysore Road till you cross R.V. Engineering College; you will find a petrol bunk on your right. Take the road adjacent to the bunk, cross the railway line and reach the outskirts of Kengeri Satellite Town. You will then see a road on your right with a board announcing that it is the road to Bangalore University. This road will again lead you to Nagadevanahalli.

### The Background



Rotary Club of Bangalore owns about one and a half acre of land bought in 1961 from the farmers. Probably, at that time they were only too willing to dispose off the land, but were also determine that it will be used for a good cause. Our club put up a two room school building and the Sulrkere Village Panchayat took over the task of running the school. This was in 1984. Having achieved something good our club lost interest and over a period of time we forgot. This recently we did not even know we owned the land.

How long the school functioned who soon appointed Motilal as his coefficiently or otherwise, is a matter of conjecture. Your guess is as good as mine. Neglect became evident and the school building was not cared for Vandals stepped in and methodically stole or removed all useful materials till only a shell remained.

This was the stage at which members of the Rotary Club of Kengeri drew our attention to a pitiable condition, in 1984. It was only natural that we did something. We did act, and this year we redeem the neglect.

### **Our Action**

The Board took a wise and right decision - to rebuild and revive the school. A second good decision followed immediately thereafter the President entrusted the ebullient and vivacious Arun Kumar with the job;

worker. A team of dedicated workers set the project in motion.

To start with we had no documents, whatsoever. All we knew was that we owned the land. We had our very anxious moments, but we succeeded in building up our file with all pertinent records, documents and the sale deed.

On our query the State Government came forward to run the school, but after completing an extensive survey of the surrounding villages and assessing the potential.

Rtn. Sundaram came out with a beautiful plan for a five room school building. We started running from pillar to post at the PWD till the buck stopped at the Govt. Chief Architect's Office, which approved and gave us the green signal. Meanwhile, Arun, Mothi and Ananth started the contribution campaign and an excellent job it turned to be fruitful and encouraging.

The construction part commenced, but we had no water. We engaged a geo



physicist and a water diviner to locate possible spots where we could get water through a bore well. Both agreed on the spots. By universal acclaim we decided to try our luck on the North Eastern corner of the plot. We stuck water at 160 feet but the yield was meagre, just sufficient to support a hand pump. Again by universal acclaim we decided, boldly to try our luck at the second point. But there was a hitch; there were two points about 15 feet apart - the difference between the geophysicist and the diviner. At this moment, when we were really undecided, Arun took a bold step,

traveled between the two points, stopped ad hoc, raised his voice and pleading on Lord Ayyappa, said that was the point to put the second bore. We stuck water at 180 feet with a magnificent yield of 700 gallons per hour. Chandrasen helped us in our quest for water. Goddess Ganga believed in our sincerity and blessed us.

The Governor of Karnataka, Sri. P. Venkatasubbaiah inaugurated the building on 28 June 1989. A fitting end for the Rotary year; we put life into the project of our lives. This is only the beginning, for Nagadevanahalli is close to our heart. We want to work in the village and improve its living conditions.

> Starting 2001, Janani Trust, an NGO, has been providing uniforms, text books, note books, teachers salaries,



mid-day meals, etc. The total assistance as of end of June 2009 works out to nearly Rs. One Crore (ten million). Children are taught from LKG to 10<sup>th</sup> Std. Computer classes from 3<sup>rd</sup> to 10<sup>th</sup> Std students. Vocational training for girls in tailoring provided and plan to introduce training in TV, Computer Repairs etc.

Children continue to study up to 10<sup>th</sup> standard, and courses in vocational training in TV, computer repairs are introduced to enable them start a career.

The club received a sum of Rs. 22 lakh for the building from the family of Alice Jennings of Australia.

Mr. K.Shivakumar Prabhat, New York, USA donated a sum of Rs.20 lakh.



and a half years back when the Bapooji Harijana Gramabhivrudhi Sangha approached for a school at Byderahalli. Manikyamma was kind enough to donate a small plot to construct the building. At the foundation laying ceremony, the club assured that the building would be ready within a year.

Rotarians of our club and the building cost was estimated at Rs.1,30,000/-. The project has so much appeal in itself as donations came from far off places. Members of the Rotary Club of Santa Maria who had visited the project site sent us US \$500 and students of Interact Club of Santa Maria sent us a collection of US\$200.

of the work were done by Rotarians of the club. The welfare association of the hutment dwellers, Bapooji Harijan Gramabhivrudhi Sangha, also helped in the construction work.

Inaugurating the building Mayor of the Bangalore City Mr. B.V.Putte Gowda, said it was a great day. He expressed that it was not only a grand gift to the people of the area but to the entire city of Bangalore.

In a democratic set up it is difficult for the government to do everything. He thanked the Rotary in reducing the burden of the government. It is not merely providing a facility but also showing a way of service to be taken up by other organisations. He advised the residents that it was their duty of how best this facility was going to be utilized.

Planning, construction and supervision Dr. Jeevaraj Alva, the area legislator, appreciated the efforts of Rotary in providing the light of education to those who were even below the line of poverty. He said Rotary means action has been proved by completing the project within the assured time. This is one of the finest example of what is possible within a year. Mr. Alva expressed that he would be more happy, if the school is run and the building maintained by Rotary, than handing it over to the Government. He requested the Rotary to start a vocation centre in the constituency.

The Community Services and Medical Services Committee constructed one more floor to the existing structure at a cost of Rs.2.20 lakhs. Contribution of Rs.1 lakh was received from one of our Rotarians and

### NGO Corporate Initiative in ratwe in Rural Education

aklavara is a sleepy little village, barely 17 km away from the Silicon City of Bangalore, and close to the Bannerghata National Park. Yet the sprawling metropolis and this village are worlds apart - in terms of wealth, education, affluence, social character, and infrastructure. The difference and the disparity is stark, and leaves you bewildered, that there can exist two such extremities of life and living standards, and in such close proximity.

Gross household incomes seldom cross Rs.30,000/- a year, drinking water is still a major problem, roads are in a shoddy state, and health and medical facilities are non existent. Most adults have a TV and a cell phone that they can ill afford, but a land line telephone line is still a dream and difficult to access, as

this service unless there is a threshold number of subscribers. To sum it up, life, in this village that dots the periphery of the globally known IT City, is pathetic, and shames modern India.

All the village children, without much choice, go to a government school in the vicinity, built on land that was once a graveyard, and around the interred tombs of the forefathers of people who were once benefactors of this village, and inheritors of a 'jodigram'. The children, though, ignore this central monument, and have got used to sitting on and reveling around these solemn and very visible tombstones that strike visitors and others as odd and morbidly inappropriate, as if the village and their children had any choice to determine where they would like to educate themselves.

Attendance at this school of 200 children was always poor and interest in education was abysmal, to say the least, until a new team of government

the department is unwilling to provide appointed teachers in the new millennium believed that they could bring about a healthy change, despite a student teacher ration of 50 to 1. They invited the Vijayam Bharani Trust to support the malnourished children with a mid day meal scheme to offer healthy, nutritious food, that is today partly the incentive for the children to go to school, and encouraged them to post attendance of almost 95%, a record for any government school. The Trust which has set up a modern eco friendly kitchen in the village, offers tasty and deliciously nutritious meals, 210 days a year, to a couple of schools in the village, including this government school.

Today the school has been adopted by the Rotary Club of Bangalore, the oldest Rotary Club in Bangalore that has spearheaded many initiatives to reach out to the community. More recently, this Club, celebrating its Platinum Jubilee, has invited Corporates to partner and support them in fulfilling their corporate social objectives by sharing resources, manpower and logistics to make a difference to the lives of those who are underprivileged and who lack the means to initiate social change without a helping hand.

One such initiative is the joining of hands in an NGO Corporate partnership between the Rotary Club of Bangalore and the ICICI Lombard GIC Ltd. which has picked the Sakalvara Government school to bring about a significant and visible change. Beginning the 1st of March, the school will have 3 new classrooms. a hall for computer education, a spanking new and levelled playground, with sports facilities, and separate toilet facilities for both boys and girls, with water storage tanks and sumps. This is probably the only government school to have a water harvesting facility, lending its mite in building a greener planet. Plans for the school include cooperating with TIDALDATA Inc., California, to distribute hand held, remarkably cheap e-pods to the children that carry their complete syllabus in several languages that can guide, teach, educate, and rapidly enhance their learning skills and establish credibility in rural education programmes, achieving objectives at affordable costs.

Rotary Club of Bangalore and the ICICI Lombard have set a wonderful

example of how meaningful Corporate with children in private schools and NGO partnerships can transform the lives of deprived children and offer hope, meaning, and opportunity to all of them, paving the way for a revolutionary approach to educating the masses and adding sense and value to rural literacy.

On the 12<sup>th</sup> of June 2009, apart from presenting the school with 60 quality benches to accommodate 200 children, Rotary Club of Bangalore introduced the Epod, a revolutionary learning device, put together by Tidaldata Inc., California, that will help accelerate the learning process, improve their grasping skills, and bring them on par

elsewhere. It will also reduce drop outs, bring a balance to the student/ teacher ratio, and assist the school management by providing much needed complementary education support. Since it is solar powered this eco friendly technology will be revolutionary teaching aid and can change the face of rural education in India.



# Rotary NSHHT School Project

Bannerghatta was in a dilapidated condition, and was conducting classes for 450 boys and girls in two buildings housing eight class rooms. Our club decided to reconstruct the school, as a worthwhile project for the year 2006-07.

The organisation OSAAT cooperated with us and donated Rs. 22 lakh for providing improved infrastructure.

OSAAT is a registered service organisation in USA. This was formed by a group of persons from Karnataka working in USA. They formed this organisation to do some service in Karnataka. Their aim was to raise funds through cultural shows in USA and use it to improve the infrastructure of a school. They wanted to take up one school at a time and hence the name OSSAT.

he Govt. Higher School at The project was completed within one year, providing six class rooms after demolishing one existing block. In addition Rotary Club of Bangalore provided sixty desks, tables, cupboards, chairs and ten computers.

# Rotary Rural School Impetus Hulkur Rotary

ealising that the real India is in the villages and that there are sufficient schools and facilities in the cities, the Rotary Club of Bangalore decided to reach out to the primary schools in the villages. These schools for primary children did not have even the basic amenity "a roofed structure to protect them from the vagaries of nature".

As it would be difficult to handle the soft portion of organizing teachers and running the school on a daily basis we decided to concentrate on creating infrastructure for the free government schools since then the area of daily administration and recurring cost would be the responsibility of the Department of Education, Government of Karnataka.

Primary school education is one of the most neglected areas at the village level

with children in the formative years not receiving the care and attention they deserve.

Our concept and modus operandi:

- 1. Get the village where the school was going to be constructed involved so that the villagers have a feeling that it is their school and not a government school.
- 2. Create a school with airy and well lit classrooms where the children would love to come everyday.
- 3. Provide hygienic maintainable toilets for the children. This is an area which is neglected by most schools built but in true Rotary style every component for the child's development is studied and addressed.
- 4. Provide sports and play equipment for the children
- 5. Get a corporate to adopt the school so that the school would be named after the corporate if he provided the funding for the school. This would mean the school would have the name of Rotary and the contributing corporate

incorporated in the school name.


Using this model of corporate sponsorship/adoption we have built schools in Hulkur in Gangapura and other villages around Malur.

These schools are now catering to the deserving and the strength of these schools has increased as children from the neighbouring villages prefer to come to our schools than the sad looking schools they were in earlier.

The schools built in the villages have shown dramatic improvements in exam performance and also with attendance.



## Rotary Menda Education Foundation

### **PREAMBLE:**

We at Rotary Club of Bangalore have supported education for many years. The larger projects have been Rotary-Seva Bharathi School at Nagadevanahalli, Rotary Ambedkar School at Byadarahalli, Parikrama and Sahasra Deepika. Several other initiatives have helped poor students and schools by providing school furniture, scholarships, notebooks, computers, and food.

The Rotary Club of Bangalore, at the initiative of PP. Rtn. G.V.Radhakrishna along with few Rotarians including Rtn. Arjun Menda started this project in 2005, aimed at educating bright students who are economically disadvantaged. The objective is to offer sustained and continuing support, by offering monetary and mentoring

from Class 5 to 2<sup>nd</sup> year PUC, and even mentoring will add very substantial up to graduation in the long term. An Education Foundation under the name Mentors will widen the vision of the of Rotary Menda Education was formed for this purpose and 25 children were identified for grant of scholarships. Total cost of schooling in government commitment and does involve personal schools average between Rs.3,000/- to Rs.5,000/- a year which will be the club's long term commitment.

The project is being funded by Rotarians and people from the public, who wish to sponsor a child's education. Rtn. Arjun Menda has matched all donations penny to penny and continues to do so.

### **MENTORING:**

Much more important than money, each child will be mentored personally by a Rotarian family, who will visit the child at home and in school, take the child out and to their own homes, and review progress of academic, extracurricular and general development, as well as generally guide the child.

> Our goals are ambitious in depth but we take that extra care in taking a child on board this project as it requires very long term nurturing.

The goals for each child:

- a. To achieve identifiable quality education, regularly monitored
- b. To keep the child from 'dropping out' of school
- c. To expose them to wider aspects of our society and culture

- environments at RCB members' facilities, thus engraining a pro-work attitude even before their entry into the work force
- e. Finally, to assist each of these children to secure a worthwhile job, in line with their potential and skills.

Against 47 children supported in 2008-09, we are funding 71 in 2009-10. Among them, girls will be 43, and boys 28 (last year we had 32 girls and 15 boys). The total value of scholarships proposed this year is Rs.305,568 (last year was Rs.220,586), and the average cost per child has dropped from Rs.4,693 to Rs. 4,244 due to adding a few more children in less expensive schools.

Though the Foundation had agreed to increase the limit of scholarships to Rs.6,000/- this amount has been given

d. To expose them to work only to one girl in the PUC, and increases have been kept to Rs.5,500/-(where we were paying Rs.5,000 last year) and new names have been added at actuals or at the figure of Rs.5,000/-. It is recommended that we follow a similar pattern next year as well.

> Secondly, we must allow payment of fees (up to Rs. 6,000) for children moving to PUC/ISC College when they get admission, as they will not wait like in a school where kids move from one class to the next.

Third, we need help to mentor the larger number of children spread out all over Bangalore, as one person is just not able to do justice to all of them. In particular, Rotarians and Anns who have proposed names should be asked to take a much more active role in this



The best thing that happened was that they were able to get in touch with Rtn. Sridhar Chari, who gladly took up the responsibility and completed the project.

40 parents of school children, the villagers, the District Education Officer, Rotarians of our club gladly participated along with the donors M/s Koch, Paul and their wives.

In Australia the regular road signs attracted attention of tourists who were not averse to taking them away as souvenirs. The donors created replicas of the road signs on their own and commercialised the venture making

# The Shankara Children's Initiative Rotary Hippocampus

ocated at 44, Ranga Rao Road, Bull Temple Road, ┛Basavanagudi, Shankara Rotary Hippocampus Children's Experience Centre is a collaborative venture of Sri Saradha Peetham, Sringeri, Rotary Club of Bangalore and Hippocampus Bangalore. This two storeyed centre with an impressive children's library has approximately five thousand books & comics all of which are well illustrated. They include fiction, non fiction, history, geography, science and encyclopedias for various ages. The multimedia collection with approximately six hundred CDs includes a whole variety of educational CDs and most popular games for all age groups.

The Library has a current membership of over one hundred and twenty five children. Children between the age group of 18 months to 14 years.

There are various membership options which range from using the facility, be it reading and using multimedia; those which entitle a child to borrow books, and books with multimedia. Children enrolled as members of the Library also have the opportunity to participate in all the weekend activities.

Why was the Children's Learning Centre Started?

Children studying in the lower end schools in communities neither have the facility of a good library nor computing facilities. Parents too are poorly educated to teach their children or buy these services at exorbitant rates. The learning centre initiative provides the first generation school going learners a healthy & safe learning environment with a package of resources which can make learning an enjoyable experience at a subsidized price.

The Learning Centre Initiative aims at broadening the horizons of education for the first generation learners (school going children).

children from the age group of six to fourteen years, started from October

The package offers the following:

- Ø A safe, clean and calm environment which is conducive for learning.
- Ø Books in the Library (Colorfully illustrated books arouse curiosity & promotes the reading habit in children). These are resources usually not found in schools that the children go to.
- Ø A Graded Multi Media Package with carefully handpicked CDs covering a range of subjects for children between 5-7 years, 7-9 years, 9-11 years and 12 and above years. CDs cover Science, Math's, English, Geography, Fiction and Games.

Computers at the Learning Centre are used to educate children the fun way. A topic on the solar system for instance

This new initiative for school going has children viewing the Magic School Bus CD which transports them to the magical world of the solar system. "Edurite" a state curriculum based package for children studying between classes 5 & 7 provides them a opportunity to learn topics being taught at schools the audio visual way. Children are allotted a forty five minute computer slot every week.

- Ø "Grow by Reading" a colour coded graded programme in English and Kannada which supports vocabulary building, reading and written skills in children.
- Ø Fun weekends for children which entitles children to participate and learn new skills in art, craft, music and other fun packed weekends.
